Dear all

The return after half term has been as busy as ever for everyone here. The students and staff at Borlase returned with renewed energy, many of them sharing the successes of the trips that they had been involved in over the break. The newsletter captures some of these experiences and I enjoyed following Twitter to see the progress of the rowers in Boston, the creative writers in Venice and the politics students in Washington. These experiences have clearly inspired the staff and students and they bring this enthusiasm back into the classroom. Our politics students could not be studying this A Level at a more interesting time; we are living through turbulence in British and international politics and never has it been more important for young people to understand the principles and mechanisms of democracy. Our students are very engaged in political debate and in tutor groups from KS3 to KS5 there is discussion about the key issues of the day. I am delighted that despite the shortened lead up to the General Election, our Year 12 politics students are organising a full mock election here at school. The school candidates will speak in assemblies and hustings, giving everyone at school the chance to be involved in the debate and to take part in the ballot. The results will be interesting to us all; few of these students will have a vote on December 12th although, in future, we may recognise the contribution that engaged sixteen year olds can bring to our decision-making.

Alongside academic study and the usual extra-curricular activities, this last two weeks saw the culmination of all the work that has been done towards the House Music competition. I cannot imagine that any school anywhere approaches House Music with the passion and enthusiasm as Borlase; even those who do not see themselves as musicians participate and are part of a performance alongside their whole House. Mr Miall, with his characteristic exuberance, introduced layer of opportunity this year with houses being able to compete as individuals, small ensembles, form groups and also as small chapel choirs. This year there were more staff entries than we have ever had before. Whole house singing involved every single student, with songs from Queen and Dirty Dancing to musical theatre favourites. Judging was a challenge! The competition concluded last night with a stunning programme of finalists showing the depth of musical talent at the school. I am certainly glad I was not judging that element of the competition. Congratulations to everyone who took part.

The rain has poured pretty relentlessly on us this week reinforcing that the decision to postpone our burpee challenge on the field was definitely the right one. Fifteen hundred people jumping back and forth with their hands in the mud yesterday would have been a disaster so I am delighted GWR were happy for us to postpone this to the summer. This gives us all a little more time to hone our skills. However, the rain stopped and the field managed to support the annual Remembrance commemoration on Monday, November 11th. Following a moving service in the Chapel the whole school gathered to hear the roll call and observe the two minutes silence together. Many of the names of Borlasians who died in the battles of the second world war are familiar to us, the sons of businesses that have named our streets and buildings around Marlow, many lost as flying officers in those air battles that changed the course of the war. I would like to thank Squadron Leader Peterson for coming to speak to us and share his reflections.

As we approach the mock examination season, my best wishes to everyone sitting or supporting their child sitting exams. Keeping a steady, healthy preparation programme is very important, so we encourage everyone to revise of course, but also to take breaks for fresh air and doing the activities that keep them positive.

## Frances Hardinge Author Visit

On Monday 11 November Borlase was delighted to welcome acclaimed Young Adult Fiction author, Frances Hardinge. Her novels have won many awards, most notably The Lie Tree, which in 2016 became the first Young Adult novel to win the Costa Book of the Year Prize since Philip Pullman's The Amber Spyglass. Frances thrilled Year 8 & 9 students with the childhood nightmares that form the basis for many of her stories, and read extracts from her new novel, Deeplight, which combines some of her nightmares with her love of scuba diving. She answered a wide range of questions, from her experience of reading English at Oxford, to her favourite fish, before signing copies of her books for students.



## Year 12 Creative Writing in Venice

Venice: the 'city of masks', perched on precarious wooden stakes driven into the mud of the ancient salt marshes, filled with art and beauty and, in the October half term, eighteen year 12s from Borlase. This swarm of teenagers, armed with enormous notebooks and ballpoint pens, descended on the city as tourists have for hundreds of years, led by the indefatigable Mr Lofthouse, Mrs Birkett and Mrs Bungey. Their eyes, wide with awe or drooping with sleep deprivation, gazed upon paintings and sculptures by Tintoretto and scribbled desperately, trying to record by pen what they had seen. These students toiled, and sweated, and in some notable cases hiccupped their way through passages, all with the same aim in mind: to capture the essence of Venice. The Galleria dell'Accademia, Santa Maria della Salute and the Basilica de San Marco, the Palazzo Ducale and the Ghetto provided inspiration for their quest to immortalise in writing the beauty and culture they had seen. It was an amazing trip and, what's more, not a single person fell into a canal!



## Year 11 Theatre Trip

On Monday 4 November 125 Year 11 students travelled to Reading to see a production of Shakespeare's *Macbeth*, one of their GCSE English Literature set texts. They saw a thrillingly sinister production which, as well as being staged in a church, had clearly been inspired by horror movies and *Killing Eve*, complete with murders behind shower curtains and a very creepy Villanelle-like nurse representing the witches. Whilst the director had taken many liberties with Shakespeare's script, not least swapping the genders of *Macbeth* and *Lady Macbeth* (who became *Lord Macbeth*), the imaginative interpretation made for some interesting discussions in both English and Drama lessons over the following days.

## Visiting speaker Dominic Grieve

Following an invitation from the Politics Society leaders, on 9th November, Borlase welcomed Dominic Grieve to speak at a Question and Answer session. The turnout was vast with more than 60 eager students attending and engaging with Mr Grieve. The session started with an informative introduction by Mr Grieve, focusing on his path into politics and his exciting political career - especially within the last 3 years! This was followed by a Q&A session where Mr Grieve replied with poignant answers that invigorated the audience. It was a rare opportunity for students to gain an intimate and unique insight into politics from a very experienced politician which hopefully inspired further political participation as "democracy keeps on breathing".



## The Senior Production 2019 – An Enemy of the People

## Sadfishing

Sadshing' is described as a behavioural trend where people make exaggerated claims about their emotional problems to generate sympathy and attention. The term was created at the beginning of the year by a blogger using the term to describe certain celebrities who embellish their emotional difficulties to generate sympathy and gain more followers. The term has now gained traction and is seen as a growing trend on social media.

The challenge with sadshing is that sometimes real problems can become overlooked or young people can even be bullied for having shared their problems online.



## Anti Bullying Week 2019 - 11-15 November

Anti-Bullying Week is coordinated by the Anti-Bullying Alliance which is based at the National Children's Bureau. The campaign was started in the early 2000s as a way of focusing the attention of schools on tackling bullying between children and young people.

This year, Anti-Bullying Week has the theme 'Change Starts With Us', underlining how everyday acts like listening to young people, having a conversation, thinking about the impact of our words or stopping before hitting 'like' on a hurtful social media post, can help to reduce bullying.



## Mental Health - State of the Nation Report

Friendship, school and a good night's sleep have all been named as key factors in a young person's happiness, in the government's first ever State of the Nation report on children's mental wellbeing.

More than four in five young people aged between 10 and 24 say they are happy with their lives, in research published to mark World Mental Health Day (Thursday 10 October), rating themselves happiest with their family and friends, their health, their school and their appearance. Bullying, including cyberbullying, remains a key reason for unhappiness or poor wellbeing, especially amongst teenage girls, whilst sleep and leisure time were also reported as important factors.

This landmark research fulfils a government commitment to bring together the best evidence on children and young people's wellbeing, identifying trends and drivers so that the right support is in place to help them fulfil their potential.



## Instagram rolls out new feature to help fight bullying

An estimated 5.43 million young people in the UK have been the victims of cyber bullying. In a bid to combat online abuse, Instagram has released a new in-app feature that will allow users to restrict the interaction they have with bullies



The new 'Restrict' feature enables you to swipe on a user, placing them on restrict. This means that you will no longer see their comments, unless you specifically tap on 'See Comment'. Nobody else will be able to view the comment, except for the bully who posted it



## Social Networking Advice for Parents

The best online safety strategy is to talk to your child.!

The online world is very much part of young people's world today, they are "growing up digital", and technology is embedded in every aspect of their lives.

As parents your natural desire is to keep your children safe.

In every aspect of development, from learning to cross the road, ride a bike or swim, parents teach, guide and support their children. It is no different in the online world.

The best online safety strategy, regardless of the age of the user or the technology involved, is to talk with your children and to engage with their use of the Internet.

Remember, the chances of your child sharing their online experiences with you will be greatly reduced if they think that telling you about a problem will result in them being banned from using the Internet!

## BORLASE HOCKEY NEWS

### Week 6

Week six began with our GU12 A+B teams recording good victories on Monday against LVS, Ascot, before the BU16s travelled to Oxford to face Magdalen College School in their first indoor fixture of the season. A 6-2 victory is a reflection of the speed in which this group are developing

On Tuesday, the GU16 A team then travelled to Stowe School for their 'friendly' County Tournament and, after three wins and two draws from their five games, came away in first place. The group also made big strides in their team dynamics, which was pleasing to see ahead of their National Cup R1 game today.

The BU16 B team also travelled away on Tuesday and competed well against a strong Kingston Grammar School side.

Wednesday was our busiest day of the season so far with twelve fixtures in total. At the top end of the school, the GU18 team lost to another strong Kingston Grammar School side and the BU18 narrowly lost 0-1 to Whitgift. The BU16s played another indoor fixture against Charterhouse, winning 5-4 in the dying moments to end a good week for them.

The junior sides had plenty of fixtures as well on Wednesday with the BU12s drawing two and losing one of their fixtures against Merchant Taylors' School, the BU13s won one and lost two against the same opposition and the GU13s were competitive in defeat against Beaconsfield High School.

On Thursday, the GU14 squad played in their County Finals at Stowe School and qualified for the Regional Heats as county runners-up after winning two and losing one of their games. This is a great achievement in their first season of 11-a-side hockey.

To end the week, a GU16 and GU18 combined indoor team drew one and lost one against Beaconsfield High and Great Marlow respectively in a well contested triangular on Friday. The GU12s also had fixtures on Friday against Kingston Grammar School, losing one and drawing two.



## Week 7

In the final week before half-term, w/c Monday 15th October, there were a number of fixtures, including two EH National Cup matches.

On Monday, the GU13s played three competitive fixtures against strong Kingston Grammar School teams with the A team losing 2-3 in the last minute and the B&C teams competing well. A combined GU16 and GU18 indoor team then won their first indoor league game of the season later on in the evening.

Tuesday was busy for our U16 teams with the GU16 A team winning their National Cup fixture 9-0 against Bradfield College and the BU16 A team beating Whitgift U15s 2-1. The BU16 B team were also in action against West London Free School A team, losing out in a competitive fixture.

On Wednesday, the BU18s continued their preparation for the regional indoor tournament with a series of fixtures at Charterhouse School and the GU18s lost out on penalty strokes in the EH National Cup.

Both U14 A teams lost on Thursday against Whitgift (BU14s) and Dr Challoner's (GU14s) but both continued their development this season, before the BU14 B team played a competitive fixture on Friday, drawing 0-0 before losing out on penalty strokes.

## Week 8

Monday 4th November was dominated by indoor preparation and the BU18, BU14 and GU18 teams all had fixtures. The BU14s and BU18s both beat MCS Oxford in close and competitive games, whilst the GU18s kept their winning streak going in the indoor league with a 6-5 victory against Wycombe.

Tuesday saw the indoor preparations continue with the BU16s travelling to Whitgift to play in an extremely beneficial fixture, during which they held their own for long periods against a strong Whitgift indoor team.

The BU18s were the first team to play in the indoor Regional Prelims on Wednesday - they won three and lost one to qualify for the Regional Heats in second place. The junior teams then had a busy afternoon with the GU12s winning one and losing two of their fixtures against St. Mary's and the GU13s winning one and losing one against Wycombe High.

On Thursday, the GU16s travelled to Aylesbury High for their Regional Prelims and also won three and lost one to qualify as runners-up for the Regional Heats. It was then the GU18s turn on Friday and, having travelled with only seven players, did a great job to lose only one of their three games. They came away from the competition with their heads held high having only narrowly missed out on qualification for the next stage.

## Half-Term Hockey Camps

During the half-term break, Borlase Hockey and Marlow Hockey Club joined forces to run two hockey camps at Marlow Hockey Club on Monday 28th and Tuesday 29th October.

Across the course of the two days, we had around 60 players join us for some additional half-term hockey that included plenty of games, fun and quizzes! The Super Sticks camp (for Y1-Y6 students) ran from 9am-12pm both days and the Hockey Academy (for Y7-Y11 students) ran from 11am-5pm.

## Amsterdam 2019

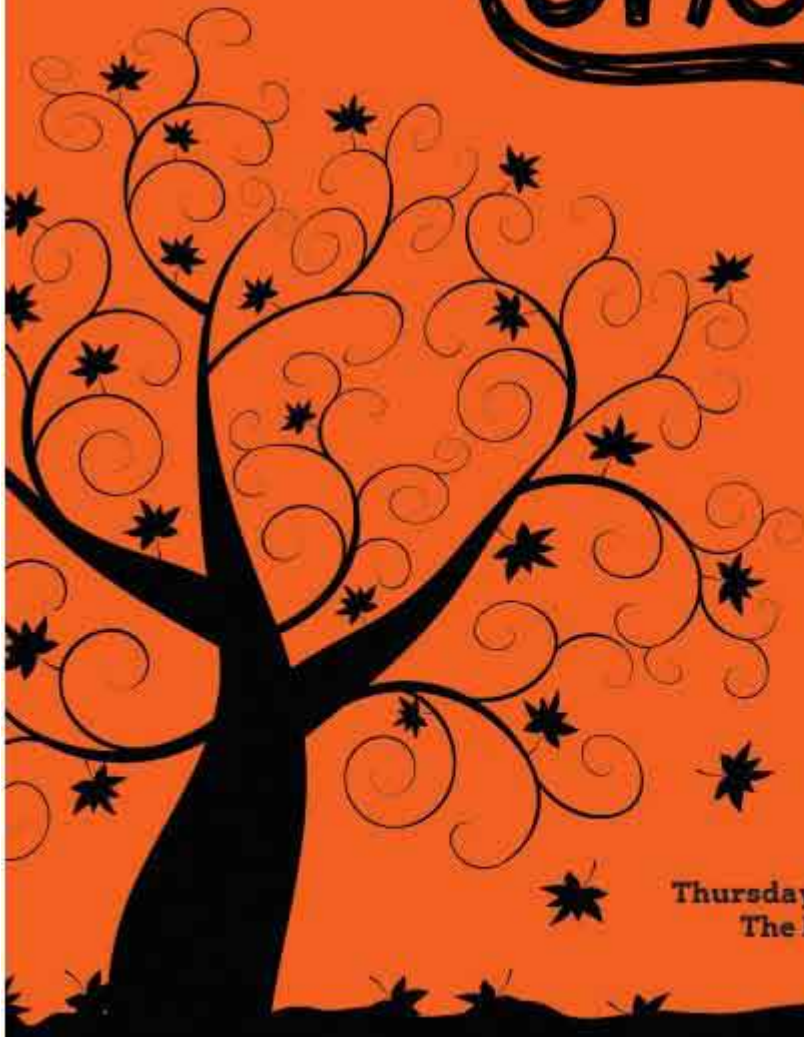
