Dear all

Happy New Decade! It hardly seems a couple of years ago that we were worrying about the millennium bug and singing along to Robbie Williams and now, here we are, starting the third decade of the twenty first century. We are living in interesting times and times that bring with them new challenges. I have been speaking to the students in Chapel about 18th century philosophy and the age of enlightenment; a period in our history where key concerns were social inequality, poverty, division between nations and the impact of overpopulation on the environment. It was a period of major developments in science, travel to new worlds and progressive thinking when the principles of liberty, tolerance, education for all were expounded by philosophers who sought solutions based on new ethical principles. The challenges we now face are not that different but perhaps even bigger as reports show this to have been the warmest decade on record. We need new philosophical thinkers and new scientists, innovative ideas and an appetite for discovery - a new age of enlightenment that needs to start in schools like Borlase. Listening to Year 7 students who joined me this week for tea, they shared with me their excitement about starting STEM projects and about learning subjects they had never experienced before. A team of Year 8 students are competing in a Climate Emergency Forum, putting forward a range of proposals, and our Eco Committee have received a very positive expression of support for a Borlase Meat-Free Monday of over 80% - so the Borlase Enlightenment is underway for 2020.

Our Year 13 students have completed their mocks this week and I am delighted to see those who have applied to university this year start to receive excellent offers for the courses they have chosen. Our Year 11 students are responding to the helpful lessons learned from the mock examinations and I am incredibly impressed by the way they have started the term, making the most of the time they have gained by sitting the exams before Christmas, to develop their confidence further. Many of you, as Year 11 parents have signed up for the parents' revision workshop led by Miss Holmes next Wednesday. This is an excellent opportunity for parents to understand how you can support your child in steady, systematic revision over the next months as they move towards the final exams.

In school, the KS4 and KS5 Teams will continue to encourage all our examination students to look after their physical and mental health by continuing to stay active, to eat healthily and to ensure they get enough sleep. They will also remind the students to avoid anxiety through working systematically rather than leaving everything until the end.

Although we are just a couple of weeks into term there has already been a huge amount of enrichment and extra-curricular activity. There have been sports fixtures, theatre trips, a German exchange visit and by the time you are reading this, we will have crowned our Strictly Come Dancing Champions for 2019/20. I am writing this newsletter before tomorrow night's competition but have had a previewed glimpse of the talent and enthusiasm that the audience will be treated to in the theatre. It amazes me every year how high a standard of dance and confidence our Year 8 finalists can reach with so little time to learn a dance style and then choreograph and perform it for an audience. A full review of the show will be in the next newsletter.

Whilst on the theme of Strictly Ballroom, one of our very experienced dancers who has competed at national level for years, is starting lessons for adults - his advert is in the newsletter. So this may be your moment!

## Single Entry to Site - Safeguarding

Looking after the safety of our students on the school site is always our priority and we have listened to the advice of assessors we invited in to look at the site before Christmas. Schools are recommended to have a single entry point to the site to make monitoring most efficient. The majority of our students enter school via Chapel Gate in the mornings which we are able to supervise. Some students walk along the path between Quoitings and Colonel's Meadow which has now become very muddy and slippery due to sustained heavy rainfall. By having this gate open we are unable to monitor who might use it to enter the site so we have made the decision to keep it locked and ask all students to enter via Chapel. I apologise that this will add a few minutes to walk for students coming down Spinfield Hill but we recommend that they do NOT change their route by walking down Spinfield Lane, as there is no pavement. We will remind students of this through assemblies and point out the importance of walking on the pavements if they come down Oxford Road.

## PUBG Mobile (PEGI 16)

You may not have heard of PlayerUnknown's Battleground (PUBG) Mobile but it is more than likely your child will have. It is the mobile version of PUBG so it has been optimised for iOS and Android devices. To give you an idea of the scale of the mobile version of this game its gross earnings since launching in February 2018 is \$1.3 billion. It is similar to Fortnite in that it is a scavenger/ survival style game where players are dropped on an island with up to 99 other players and the winner is the last player standing. Players have to find weapons, tools and other equipment and hunt other players.

What do I need to be aware of?

- Weapons: The aim of this game is to kill other players so players are using realistic weapons.
- Chat feature: as with all games of this nature, one of the significant concerns is the game chat feature, which may mean your child is subjected to inappropriate language. The chat facility can be disabled via the settings.
- Blocking: ensure your child knows how to block other players.
- In-app purchases: in-app purchases can be very expensive in this game and range from £0.79 - £184.99

## What are Anonymous Apps?

Anonymous apps allow users to share and interact with each other without revealing who they are. Unlike social media sites, many of these apps encourage users to stay anonymous and chat to each other or post questions and answers on a range of topics. Although anything shared on these apps is anonymous, it's important to note that anonymity is not guaranteed as certain types of information like an IP address or cookies can be used to identify who you are. Also, some apps sync to a users contact list or location to provide a personalised experience on the platform.

### Why are these apps popular with children?

The ability to be anonymous and ask questions that may be sensitive or embarrassing is one reason why millions of teens worldwide are using these apps. Also, these apps remove the anxiety of presenting your 'best self' online and allow teens take on different personas and explore different ideas without fear of repercussions.

Anonymous apps can expose children to a range of online risks, including inappropriate content, cyberbullying and sexting. Under the cover of anonymity, people may feel less accountable for what they say and may share things that they would not on open social platforms. By the very nature of these apps, keeping teens safe becomes that much more of a challenge, so having regular conversations on the subject is key. Make it a habit to talk about which apps they are using and any associated watch outs.

## Instagram restrict mode

Instagram have introduced a new feature that allows users to restrict another user. You could restrict somebody (a bully for example) which means they will not be able to see when you are online or if you've read their messages. Also, only you (and that user) will be able to see their comments on your post. The great thing about this feature is that they won't know that you have 'restricted' them. This is different to blocking (when you block somebody, you no longer see anything they do on Instagram and they don't see anything you do either).

# Borlase Rowing News

## Rowathon 2020

On Sunday 6th January Borlase Rowing held their bi-annual rowathon. The rowathon is one of the clubs largest fundraisers. As well as raising money to purchase vital equipment for our athletes to train and race in we also donate money to charities. This year we chose to donate to Making Marlow Dementia Friendly (MMDA) and the Mayors Charity for Children's Mental Health.

Borlase rowing had over 120 athletes from year 9 to year 13 racing all day in 12 different teams. We also had a parents team and a coaches team. Each team had a target split to try and hold throughout the day and the team closest to this split would be crowned rowathon champions 2020!



We had live updates on our teams progress throughout the day projected on the wall. All of our teams rowed over 100km in the day with the total distance at just under 1.4 Million meters!

Our athletes were generously sponsored by friends and family and we are hoping to raise enough to purchase 2 new racing single sculls for our rowers to train and race in. The whole squad will benefit from these purchases.

### Year 9+10 Squads

Our current singles which are in good condition will immediately be freed up for our year 9 and 10 squads to use for everyday training, which we have never had the luxury of before. These year 9's will be the first group we have had with regular access to single sculls. Training in a single scull teaches you so much more boat skill and technique than being in a big, comfortable, stable octuple. This will bring the standard of the junior squads on hugely. Some of these rowers have already been identified to have the potential to be selected to race at the GB trails next season. The new boats will be available for these rowers to compete at the trails when they get in to year 11 and something for all of our junior squads to aspire to race and compete in.

### Senior Squads

Next season we could have up to 12 athletes invited to race at the first set of Great Britain Trials in Boston. This year we have 6/7 rowers who may be invited to trial and have been fortunate enough to rely on the generosity of some of our ex rowers to lend singles for us to use. The purchase of these new racing singles will be vital if we are to offer our current squads the equipment needed to fulfil their aspirations.

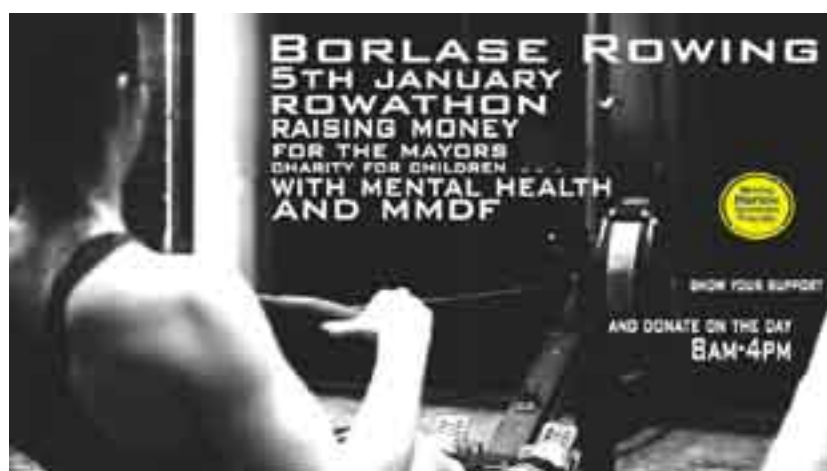
