Message from Our President

As the School's 400th anniversary year draws to a close, so does my (second) term of office as President of the Old Borlasian Club. I am delighted to announce that Kay Mountfield will succeed me as President at the Club's AGM on 3 December. As a former Headteacher, Kay will already be well known to all of you, as is her commitment to the School and all Borlasians. The committee looks forward to working with her as the Club goes from strength to strength.

There is strong precedent for Headteachers becoming President of the Club. When the Club was founded in 1907 by the then-Headteacher, Rev'd Albert Skinner, the first President was former Headteacher, Rev'd Michael Graves, who served until 1933. Former Headteacher Roy Smith was President in 2000–2001, and former Acting Headteacher Don Banner was President in 2001–2002. Kay also becomes only the third female President in the Club's history.

On 11 November, Old Borlasians attended the annual Service of Remembrance in the School Chapel. Andy Howland (Staff 1989–2008) laid a wreath on behalf of the Old Borlasian Club, and Chris Funnell (OB 1975–1978) did a reading.

I hope to see many Old Borlasians at the Alumni Carol Service at All Saints' Church in Marlow on 17th December. The Club will also host the President's Sherry Party on the last day of term to thank the staff for all their hard work over the past year.

It has been a privilege to serve as President over the past 2 years. Thank you to all the committee members who have supported me and ensured that the Old Borlasian Club continues to thrive.

Borlase Boat Club

Borlase Boat Club had a challenging season last year, hampered by the weather and conditions on the water cancelling much of the training and many races and regattas. They also dealt with the discovery of RAAC in the gym ceiling with resilience and adapted successfully to outdoor indoor training under canvas throughout the winter. We are delighted to have moved to our new site at Gossmore Park under a new Director of Rowing, Jonathan Keir.

Despite this the club enjoyed remarkable success with almost 100 rowers involved in the programme, representation at Henley Royal Regatta for our senior boy's quad, and our senior girl's quad making it through qualifications to the side-by-side racing at Henley Women's Regatta where they came up against the current U19 world champion crew. Our girls U16 quad qualified to represent Upper Thames in the Junior Interregional Tournament and went on to become champions, a long-awaited national gold medal for our girls' programme.

Few rowing clubs have overcome so much in the last year. And this success is a testament to the commitment of not only the current rowers, but also those that have gone before and set the standard. We are one of the smallest clubs and funding is challenging. We need new boats to give the rowers the opportunities they deserve. And we are looking to ensure the new site has the infrastructure required to enthuse and support the next generation. Boathouse News

With the phase 1 site works for the new boathouse completed late in the summer the Boat Club were in a position to start the short transfer journey across the river from Longridge to the new site.

Together with Great Marlow School, boats and racking were slowly transported and set up hoping to be ready for the beginning of the autumn term. Unfortunately, the installation of the pontoons and riverbank work for the Boating Area were delayed and not completed until the end of September.

To delay things further, after heavy rain, the river soon reached flood level. Although there was no rowing on the river the hinged access ramps which lead on to the pontoons were immediately tested with the water level rising more than 1 metre which at least proved that they worked.

The Club has had to wait until early November to start using the new site and Boating Area and to enjoy their newfound independence at last. Meanwhile, the building project for the boathouse is being looked at in more detail to establish the likely cost and allow fundraising to proceed in earnest.



Tom Dean enjoys more Olympic success in 2024

Tom Dean MBE (OB 2011 - 2018) won the third Olympic gold of his career to date to help Great Britain retain their men's 4x200m freestyle title in magnificent fashion at [Paris 2024](#) this summer.

Tom Dean once again teamed up with Duncan Scott, James Guy and Matt Richards to win Britain's first swimming gold medal of the Games in the Paris La Defense Arena.

The quartet have dominated the event in recent years, winning gold at both [the rescheduled Tokyo Games in 2021](#) and at the 2023 World Championships in Japan.

As Tom commented after the race:

"I don't think you can put it into words. This is what we all dream of. This is what I have been dreaming of for three years since we won. We are the first team with the same quartet to defend an Olympic [swimming] title – it's incredible."

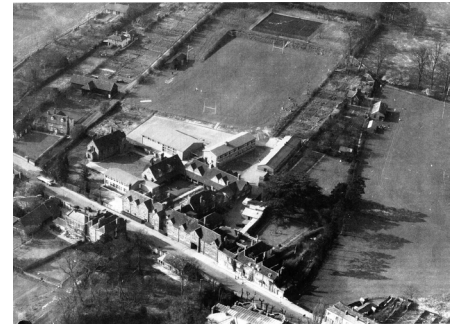

Aerial Photographs of Borlase

1956

There were 338 pupils at the School and was the year when Mr Booth retired as Headmaster. He was replaced by Mr Hazleton, who oversaw a number of new buildings to cater for the growing pupil intake. The South Block was built with new classrooms below and a large Art Room on the first floor. On the site of the old cricket nets, directly behind The Cloisters, the North Block was built creating more teaching spaces and including a new Assembly Hall, which took up more than half of the site. The new Hall had its own stage and was used for music concerts as well as the new Gymnasium for PE.



1966

As the School continued to grow in pupil numbers so the need to expand the School facilities became more pressing. In 1963, next to Home Meadow and dug on the site of the Headmaster's own allotment, the School swimming pool was built. It was 25m long and 3m deep at the deep end. The aerial photo also showed the School's cricket pitch at the top of Colonel's Meadow. In 1965 Colonel's Meadow, which had been leased to Borlase at a peppercorn rent since 1890, was purchased by the County and passed onto the School.



1993

Lady Verney High School was a girls' Grammar School in High Wycombe, Buckinghamshire, England that closed in 1993. It merged with Wycombe High School but a small intake of girls came to Borlase's Sixth Form in 1988. The School's move to becoming a co-educational School again necessitated an expansion of School facilities. A new Gymnasium and Music suite, adjacent to the swimming pool, opened in 1990 and freed up more classroom space on site. Student numbers continued to increase to more than 800 by 1994.



2022

With pupil numbers reaching 1100 the School now resembles more of a campus with numerous new buildings and excellent sports facilities catering for all sports. The Audrey Moore Building housing a new canteen, Art and English Departments as well as the new Sixth Form Common Room was built. The Sixth Form was later moved to the new white, modern building in 2016. The Weston Building for Technology and the Performing Arts, including a purpose built 250-seater theatre, opened in 2006.



Sadly, the outdoor swimming pool, which had been a feature of Borlase since 1963, had to close to allow for these new building projects. The need for new sports facilities also meant developing on Home Meadow, where a new sports centre and artificial hockey pitch were built, leaving Colonel's Meadow and Quoitings Piece as the only grass playing areas on the site. Cricket and Hockey are now played at Marlow Sports Club after a long-term usage agreement was signed in 2011.

Curtains Down for Performing Arts Staff – And Another Opening of Another Show

This year the school bid farewell to two of its long-serving stalwarts from Borlase Performing Arts.

When the school was awarded Performing Arts Status in 2005 Dr Holding appointed some new staff to take the arts forward as a school. I had the wonderful job of being able to lead the arts from 2005 and was joined by an outstanding team of exceptional talent and dedication.

Mark Hartley, was leading the Production Arts Department in a Further Education College and was highly regarded nationally for his work in vocational education. Mark introduced Technical Theatre and Production Arts BTEC to the Sixth Form programme at Borlase and over the 19 years he was at school, inspired a generation of outstanding practitioners who went on to Drama Conservatories and who are now running theatres across London and beyond.



He set up JAM Theatre with Jo Noel Hartley based at the school, providing young people and adults from all around Marlow to get involved in Music, Dance and Theatre. Mark stopped working at the school in an official capacity this summer to take up the professional opportunities he kept turning down in order to keep supporting the school. He is very busy designing sets for productions in the West End and around the World - but he is still finding time to lend his expert advice to school.

In 2009, he was joined by a new Performing Arts Technician in Jennifer (Jenny) Chislett. Jenny arrived about a week before we opened *The Pirates of Penzance*, with our current Director of Music, one Mr Seth Miall (OB 2002 - 2009), in a lead role. Jenny rose to every challenge that was thrown at her, and over the 15 years has enabled the school to put on myriads of wonderful Dance shows, Musical and Drama Productions and Concerts. Jenny created the Strictly Come Dancing set which has become one of the school's annual highlights - so many of you reading this will have competed while in Year 8 over the last 19 years!

Jenny, along with Mark, masterminded Rocktober which continues to provide budding rock bands with a great platform and Jenny created all those wonderful films for the annual Arts Dinner which has been running since 2008. Jenny trained film-makers, technicians, make-up artists and created a warm and welcoming, supportive atmosphere for all of the students (and staff!).

She has taken on a role at the Liverpool Everyman and Playhouse Theatres and is already making an impact.

It was fabulous to have Mark and Jenny create the set and whole experience that was the Borlase Birthday Bash for our 400th this summer - Big Wheel, bouncy castles, two outdoor stages and pyrotechnics of course! It was lovely to see so many techies back to say farewell and thank you too to all who sent in messages.

Service of Remembrance

11th November 2024

There were many impressive contributions by staff but, as always, the pupils were massively involved

There were important performances by organist Hugh Robson and by Director of Music, Seth Miall and the Cantorum.

In the Chapel, Year 7 congregated along with some senior pupils, some staff and a few Old Borlasians. There were many moving readings which were spoken by staff, by Old Borlasian Chris Funnell but mainly by pupils from either year 13 or year 7.

Poppies were laid on behalf of our six Houses.

A departure from previous Remembrance Services was the taking place on the tennis courts of considerably more of the Service. That allowed Years 8 to 13 and more staff to experience much more.

A number of the pupils wore their services cadet uniforms.

There were four pieces which were read out by senior pupils. Among them was a brief but impressive account of each of the actions listed near the start of this article.

Four wreaths were laid – one of them being from the Club. After the Service, the wreaths were transferred to the Chapel.

Those pupils in cadet uniform read out the names of our War dead.

Two pupils played The Last Post and Reveille

Of course, the Silence was impeccably observed.

Since my retirement from Borlase's in 2008, it has been my privilege to attend virtually every such service to be held at the school. Of them, for me, without doubt, this was the most outstanding

SIMON SHARP

(OB 1957 - 1965)

It is with much sadness that I have to report the death of my old rowing crewmate Simon Sharp. Simon emerged to become one of the top oarsmen at School and was Captain of Boats in his last two years at the same time as being Head Boy. We rowed together in the School's First Eight in 1964, Simon at stroke and me backing him up at seven. He was built to be an oarsman, tall and strong and with his red hair suggesting great competitiveness.



On leaving Borlase he went on to study engineering at St John's College Cambridge and furthered his rowing career there rowing in his college crew, Lady Margaret Boat Club, which won the Ladies Plate at Henley Royal Regatta in 1966. He then just missed out on a place in the Cambridge Blue boat having to settle for Goldie instead. His university crewmates described him as "a brilliant 6-man totally dependable and consistently good-natured". That is exactly how I remember him as well.

After university Simon worked for Costains on major engineering projects sometimes traveling abroad. Later he did a further engineering degree at Imperial College and specialised in concrete structures. He continued with his rowing career at Leander, Quintin and Marlow Rowing Clubs. Among his notable rowing achievements were winning National Championship Pairs and representing England. Simon eventually eased off competitive rowing at a high level and took up skiffing instead.

In the 1970s Simon left engineering and transitioned to management training and later founded his own Communication Skills business. He met his wife Prudence through this work and they married in 1981. They have two sons, Edward and Harry. A man of many talents, Simon took up playing the baritone saxophone and played with the Bucks Berks and Oxen Big Band amongst other concert jazz bands over the past 20 years or so.

In 1994 four of us from the 1964 School First Eight got together for a paddle on the Marlow reach where it had all begun 30 years before, Simon taking his rightful position at stroke. We all remembered how good we were then!

Simon was a true gentleman, always welcoming when you met him with his very firm handshake and a joy to be around. His death at the age of 78 followed a short illness and even though, sadly, he had developed early signs of dementia it was a great shock to his family and everyone that knew him.

ALEX SCOTT - (1975 – 2024)

Alex died of a heart attack, aged just 48. Whilst at school, he enjoyed engaging in many sports, playing rugby, squash and basketball, and is fondly remembered as being gentle and kind. From his schoolmates’ recollections, Andy Howland was able to deliver a beautiful eulogy at Alex’s funeral.



Later in life, Alex developed an irrepressible thirst for general knowledge, was an avid reader, home gardener, and greatly enjoyed adventures in cooking. He was the one you would have wanted on your team in a pub quiz, or inviting you round for an ‘adventurous’ meal.



He will be remembered as a loving husband to Shannon and a devoted father to Milo, as well as a committed pack leader to the family spaniel, Scout. He is survived by his parents Harry and Diane, and sister Caroline.

MICHAEL EAGLETON - (1943 - 2024)

(OB 1953 - 1960)

Michael Eagleton, a cherished Marlow resident, leaves behind a lasting legacy as founder of Marlow Jazz Club, former chairman of Marlow United Football Club, and a beloved radio presenter.

Michael passed away on September 9, aged 81, following a brief illness. He was cremated privately on September 20, as per his wishes. His wife, Anne, described him as her “soul mate and best friend.”

Born in 1943, Michael spent his entire life in Marlow. A former pupil of Sir William Borlase’s Grammar School, his early jobs included work at a greengrocers and a paper company. In 1968, he married Anne, and in the mid-1970s, he opened his own record shop, Chiltern Sound, in Spittal Street. The store became a local hub for music lovers and even welcomed David Bowie during a promotional tour.



His passion for jazz saw him establish connections with the prestigious Pizza Express Jazz Club, bringing renowned artists like Dexter Gordon and Jimmy Witherspoon to Marlow. Simon Lenton, who now co-runs the club, praised Michael’s dedication and deep knowledge of jazz.

Michael’s contributions extended beyond music. As chairman of Marlow United Football Club in the 1990s, he witnessed the team play Tottenham Hotspur in the FA Cup. In 2007, he began presenting Swing That Music on Marlow F.M., a show that reflected his love for jazz and delighted listeners with live concert recordings from his extensive archives.



Friend and fellow presenter Paul Mansell described Michael as a “sublime presenter” and “irreplaceable.” His passion and stories leave a significant gap in the community he loved and served.

SIMON BEVERIDGE

(OB 1989 - 1995)

Sadly, Simon, aged 47, passed away unexpectedly at his home in East Devon.

Whilst I did not know Simon well, I do remember him as being cheerful, polite and with a very slight hint of good-natured mischief. He excelled in our swimming galas – battling it out with Kevin Wills. He was a good skier and as such was a very popular member of some SWB ski trips.

It was a given that he would be made Head of Saxons.

I enclose tributes from two of his peers:

“Simon stood out as someone who got on really well with everyone. He was smart and got consistently good grades. He had a wonderful sense of humour and was liked and respected by all. He was just a lovely, lovely man - always with a smile. He was never complaining or negative.”

“Simon was in the year above me at SWB and we didn't really cross paths there, but I did know him to be a friendly, cheerful and kind guy. I assume he took a year off after school because, on my first day at University in Sept 1996, as I was queuing in my dauntingly big hall of residence with all of the fellow freshers to get our room keys, nervously trying not to look too nervous, I heard someone shout my name – and over bounced Simon B. After greeting me like a long-lost pal, he introduced me to some other fellow freshers he'd just met, and then some others. In fact, it seemed that he already knew all 300 residents - despite only having been there for half an hour! And so, it would continue. His positive, enthusiastic, high-energy appetite for life, willingness to have a friendly chat to anyone and his sense of humour quickly endeared him to all. He formed many close and lifelong friendships, as do many in their first year at Uni. However, I doubt that many were as universally well-known and liked.

RIP Simon B.”

Simon worked for a global machine vision company and, in 2007, with a colleague, founded SIGA Vision “a leading designer of automated visual inspection systems”

Simon left a wife, Ann, and a very young daughter, Alice.

Trip down memory lane – Borlase in 1975

With the loss of some key players the Borlase Chess Club faced the prospect of an arduous season but some new talent emerged and the School performed admirably in the “Sunday Times National Chess Competition” losing late on in the competition after a fierce struggle with Eton College.

With support from the newly formed Parents’ Association Borlase welcomed its first videotape recorder together with a hired colour TV receiver making it possible to use televised programmes in lessons, no matter when they were broadcast. Room 13, next to the Geography Room, became the School’s first Visual Aids Room.

Borlase’s own version of “It’s A Knockout” was into its 2nd year courtesy of Alan Black Entertainments featuring soccer skittles, jelly obstacle races on dry land and “Goal of the Month” diving headers and ping pong with fishing nets in the pool. Significant funding was raised on the day to help finance various school projects.

The Borlase Boat Club became self-sufficient in 1975 with the purchase of a purpose-built rowing trailer on which to transport boats and blades to Heads and Regattas. Borlase Rowing had a disappointing year overall but other sports had great seasons with the Hockey 1st team winning all of their matches except a late 2-1 loss to arch rivals RGS High Wycombe. The Cricket 1st team also had a great season and avenged the Hockey loss against RGS with a convincing victory on Colonel’s Meadow.

Borlase U15s sides excelled this year in rugby, hockey and cricket – Borlase Sport looked in good hands for the rest of the seventies.

The School play in 1975 was G.B Shaw’s “Androcles and the Lion”, the revered Chemistry teacher, Mr Ogden, President of the Borlase Aeronautical Society, successfully restored and flew his own aircraft, while the Railway Society made a visit to Barry Island, where over 100 steam trains awaited the breakers prompting one member to comment “A trip to Barry would sadden the most avant-garde rail enthusiast”
