





Borlase 400 Update

On Monday, January 15th Mr Goodall was delighted to open the new Borlase 400 Centenary Hall to our Sixth Form Students and Staff. This is an exciting and muchawaited school improvement following a long period of fundraising and school development. Thank you to everyone who has contributed to the Borlase 400 Campaign giving us our Sports Hall and Campus, Science Lab, Computer Lab, new toilets, Maths Rooms, MFL rooms and so much more.

We were keen to give the students access to this facility as soon as we could as the completion was delayed; we will invite all of you who have contributed to the Be Part of the Story Campaign to come in and see the installation and there will be more information about the project as part of the Borlase 400 Exhibition in the summer. The later finishing date on the building means there is **still a chance** for you to have your or your child's name on a "book" in the impressive art installation if you click on this <u>link</u>.

The Centenary Hall along with a newly expanded and upgraded Canteen and Kitchen means that students across the year groups have somewhere warm and smart to eat and have access to a wider range of healthy foods - this has always been a priority for the students, staff and parents.

The Centenary Hall is also a wonderful, permanent celebration of our 400th birthday! It provides an inspirational environment for our senior students and staff to have a coffee and work collaboratively or independently. The robust desks and coffee-shop style comfortable seating have built-in charging points for laptops and there is all day access to The Stage Cafe. It has a projector for presentations and assemblies and is a stylish, modern space fit for our students and staff. It is also a warm and welcoming venue for parents' evenings, larger meetings and presentations.

The old draughty windows in the 1960's building have been replaced as part of a change to the facade making the building more in keeping with the rest of the Chapel Cloister, and central to the design are two large stained glass windows designed by Petri Anderson who also designed the windows on the front of the Chapel. The pair of windows depict the historic school and celebrate the modern era of education at Borlase. They were donated by the family of Old Borlasian, the late Stuart Lever and by the Borlase Trustees, chaired by former chair of governor and Old Borlasian Mr Ted Brown.

Mr Goodall thanked Miss Mountfield (Former Headteacher), Mrs Cains (Director of Development) and Old Borlasian, Harry Elliot for their work on developing the vision, design and raising funds to complete the project. Miss Mountfield loved having the opportunity to cut the ribbon and let the sixth form in at last!

Year 12 UK Space Agency Visit, 12 January

On Friday the 12th of January, Robin Mobbs from the National Space Academy came to Borlase to give a series of talks and activities about space, and how we explore, survive, and understand it. The day ranged from calculating the elliptical orbit of a plant, to trying on soviet cold war space suits, and provided a day of education and entertainment.

The first talk of the day revolved around the technology of space, and how it has adapted and evolved over the years. Robin Mobbs passed around a piece of a satellite that had come back from space to demonstrate how light the materials and parts that they send up have to be in order to keep the costs down, as sending one kilogram into space costs roughly £16,000. He also showed how spacecraft dissipate heat on reentry into the Earth's atmosphere, by heating one side of an insulation panel from the outside of a space shuttle, that had again been to space, and showing that the other side was still stone cold.

We transitioned to space exploration, not only how astronauts conduct research on the ISS, but how we are exploring deeper into space using robots and rovers. We started by analysing footage from the Perseverance rover on Mars, and how it shows that Mars, at least at some point, checked all of the boxes to accommodate life. We also learnt about the human aspect of space exploration and research, and what it would take to become an astronaut. Some of us got the opportunity to try on an old, Soviet era space suit, and we spent 15 minutes doing some basic astronaut aptitude tests. Turns out it's quite difficult to be an astronaut.

Finally, we ended the day by focusing on aerodynamics and engineering. We first drew up graphs and learnt about Space X's Falcon heavy rockets, and learnt more about the future of space travel, and its commercial uses. We then moved onto building and then firing our own rockets. We learnt about the aerodynamics of fin stabilisation on rockets, and how the placement of the fins on a rocket changes how it will fly. We were then put into groups to put this knowledge to the test, along with our own ingenuity, and built our own miniature rockets to be launched on the field.

Overall, the day gave everyone an excellent insight into all of the ins and outs of space, from the theoretical and mathematical, to the practical and adventurous side.

Yr 7 Windsor Castle Trip, 5 January

On a cold but bright morning in January, 150 year seven students and staff embarked on our SWBGS inaugural trip to Windsor Castle. The visit was an opportunity to enrich the student's study of 'The development of Church, state and society in Medieval Britain 1066-1509' and, in particular, castles. Windsor Castle, an official residence of the monarch, is the oldest and largest inhabited castle in the world. Since the building of a wooden fortress at the time of William the Conqueror, the Castle has been transformed over the centuries into a splendid palace, while still retaining much evidence of its turbulent past.

The Borlase History Department has a unique connection with Windsor Castle. For the past five years, we have had the privilege of being able to display some of our best Year 7 castles from an annual competition at their new Education Centre. In this Education Centre the students were given a lesson on the history of the castle, the feudal system and how William took control of the country after 1066.

St Georges chapel gave the students an amazing understanding of the hundreds of years of monarchy, right up to the present day. This chapel was designed for the Most Noble Order of the Garter and was begun by Edward IV. It is now the final resting place of the late Queen Elizabeth II. Above the choir stalls hang the insignia of the Knights of the Garter, their swords, helmets, and banners; to the backs of the stalls are affixed their heraldic stall plates. We were fortunate to have a talk from Andrew Stafford, Old Borlasian Head of English (1981-2001) who now works in the Chapel.

The state rooms gave us the opportunity to understand how Windsor Castle was transformed "from a military fortification into a gothic palace," under King Edward III and subsequent Monarchs. The castle's staterooms are some of the most impressive and awe-inspiring rooms in the world, and they were definitely worth visiting.

The students were a credit to themselves and the school. Many visitors, from all around the world, kindly complemented the staff on their excellent standard of behaviour and respect. Well done year 7.

Yr 11 Geography Field trip to High Wycombe, 10-12 January

On a cold January day, the year 11 geographers visited High Wycombe town centre to carry out their human geography field work. The group initially went to the Field Studies Council centre in Amersham where their staff explained the principles of urban data collection. By mid-morning the students were working in small groups walking along transects across High Wycombe town centre doing an environmental quality survey and field sketching at predetermined locations.

After lunch the groups were allocated areas of the town centre to record urban land use. Questionnaires were used to determine shoppers' perceptions of High Wycombe and, while some groups had difficult persuading any shoppers to stop and answer, one group had difficulty preventing a particularly garrulous respondent from taking up the entire half hour allocated to the task.

Although cold, the lack of rain and clear skies made for a pleasant day out of the classroom and enabled all the data to be collected effectively. Borlase students also took the opportunity to help the local economy during the lunch hour, sampling the offerings of fast food outlets or coffee shops!
















Senior Production, Jesus Christ Superstar, 5-8 February

Sports Update

Visit to Loughborough University

We were thrilled that Loughborough University student recruitment team contacted the department to invite a group of high performing athletes from Borlase to an Aspiring Athlete Day. The group of Year 12s are all performing at exceptionally high levels in their sports and the world class facilities and structures at the University did plenty to inspire and motivate our group to strongly consider Loughborough as a possible destination for their higher education choices.

We were treated to a Q&A session with Scottish international and Women's first team hockey player Ellie, who shared her experiences of combining elite training and competition with her studies and explained the levels of support and opportunities available to student athletes across the different sports and varying levels of performance. We experienced a tour of the world class facilities with a particular highlight being the newly renovated fitness gyms 'Power' and 'Base.' The day ended with the opportunity to support the various Loughborough teams competing in BUCS fixtures. We were lucky to see the mens 3rd tennis, mens and womens 1st badminton, 3rd netball team and finally the mens and ladies 1st hockey teams including recent Old Borlasian Tilly Crampsie! I have no doubt that a number of this group will be heading back to Loughborough with family members on Open Days in the Summer and would encourage anyone else who is interested in finding out more to speak to any member of the group who will happily share their experiences

Hockey

It's the turn of the boys' to play in their respective cup competitions this term, with the BU14s, BU16s and BU18s all playing in the National Cup, and the BU12s and BU13s in county and district tournaments. The GU12s and GU13s will also be in action during the spring term. The U12s, U13s and U14s are also involved in indoor training this term, and the sports psychology and nutrition workshop will continue until the end of the academic year.

National Cup

The BU18s led by example in the first National Cup fixture of 2024 as they scraped through their Tier 2 National Cup first round match against Stowe in January. An excellent first 45 minutes left the team 4-0 up and qualification for the second round was looking like a strong possibility. Stowe mounted an excellent comeback though, and scored four goals in the final 25 minutes, including an overtime corner, to force a shootout. The teams still couldn't be separated after five shuffles each, but Borlase eventually prevailed 5-4 in the shootout to book a second round tie against St. Edward's School.

















St. Edward's travelled to Marlow Sports Club later in the month in the second round of the Tier 2 National Cup. A solid display out of possession allowed the team to grow into the match, and they comfortably ran out as 2-1 winners to set-up a third run against last year's finalists, MCS, Oxford.

The BU16s have experienced mixed fortunes in England Hockey's Tier 1 league, but they can be pleased with the progress they are making. In January, the team faced Reed's School in their first Tier 1 league match of the season. A 2-2 draw is a positive result away against another strong hockey school, and to be disappointed to leave without the three points is testament to the progress they are making. The team took an early lead before they were pegged back just before half-time to finish the first half level at 1-1. A penalty corner goal early in the second half put SWBGS 2-1 up, but they conceded three minutes from time to end the game all square at 2-2.

St. George's were next up for the BU16s but they couldn't take inspiration from the BU18 result against St. Edward's in the match before them at Marlow Sports Club. The team can take heart from a spirited performance against strong opposition, and the lessons learned from the match will stand them in good stead moving forward. The final league match against Wellington College will take place at Marlow Sports Club just before half-term.

The BU14s began their Tier 1 knockout campaign at the beginning of February against Merchant Taylors' School. Despite dominating possession and territory, the team found themselves 1-0 down at half-time. A long aerial found space behind the Borlase defence, which allowed MTS to create an overload in the circle and the forwards put the opposition a goal ahead. Despite an excellent display of possession in the second half, the team couldn't find a way back into the match as it finished 2-0 to the home side.

The GU16s also played their final competitive match of the season in January, as they made the long journey to Sutton Valence in Kent. Despite a strong second half performance in the Tier 1 plate, the team couldn't overturn the half-time deficit. The GU16s took a while to get started after the long journey, and found themselves 2-0 down at the break. A much improved performance in the second half saw Borlase fight back to get within a goal, but Sutton Valence scored a late third to leave the final score at 3-1.

Marlow HC Indoor Finals

Congratulations to the Marlow GU16 and GU18 indoor hockey teams who played in England Hockey's national indoor finals towards the end of January.

The GU16s finished as the seventh best indoor team in the country as they saved their best performance until last in the playoff. A great performance against Taunton Vale meant the team finished on a high. Always win your last match!









The GU18s can be extremely proud of their club indoor season as they finished as the third best indoor team in the country. A strong pool stage secured a semi final spot against Clifton Robinsons, but they couldn't hold onto the 1-0 half time lead to finish in third place.

Well done to Borlase students, Rosa Cook, Jasmine Elsdon and Eloise Hillebrand, who represented the GU16s, and Ruby Duncan, Martha Goodridge, Lauren Hilditch, Ellie Lane and Gracie Runcie, who represented the GU18s.

A conversation with Danielle Harris, Head of English

If someone told you that Ms Harris only joined Borlase in September last year, you probably wouldn't believe them. Our new Head of English has fitted perfectly into the framework of our school and it feels as if she has been here for years.

Speaking to Ms Harris about her transition from Reading Blue Coat to Borlase, she says that the school "is a warm and welcoming environment" and that the "friendly and funny" English Department have been fantastic in sharing her goal "to do the very best for the students" in their care.

This is Ms Harris' first time being Head of English at any school and she is certainly doing a fantastic job already. She has made changes to the curriculum for English and has chosen new, thought-provoking texts across the year groups that will be brought in next year "to keep things fresh and exciting and to showcase the best of Literature".

Ms Harris' passion for teaching literature has been exhibited in the ten years that she has dedicated to education. After achieving a degree in English Literature, and a PGCE in English, she trained in Cardiff before moving to London, where she taught for 7 years. After this, she moved to Reading.

Asking her why she wanted to teach English, she said, "I genuinely believe that books open up the world like nothing else. Books introduce us to different ideas, perspectives and voices and make us think entirely differently about something we thought we understood."

She continues, "Studying Literature is not just about literature: literature is a conduit for learning about history, politics, geography, economic theory and psychology. If you want to learn about the world and the human condition, Literature is the way to do it. The idea of filling my days with talking about Literature always seemed like a good idea to me."

When it comes to Ms Harris' preferred authors, her favourites are Hardy and Dickens, whom she regards as "geniuses" despite the "almost-unrelentingly bleak nature of their writing". Her favourite novel is Kazuo Ishiguro's "The Remains of the Day", which follows the story of Mr. Stevens, a butler in 1950s England who realises that his employer, Lord Darlington, is a Nazi sympathiser. Harris says that it is "a beautiful novel about the changing nature of England and a thoughtful human story about sacrificing personal fulfilment for duty".

It is no wonder that Ms Harris has fitted in so well at Borlase. With such passion for and dedication to her subject, she has become part of the number of teachers here who share the same passion for their own subjects.
