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Message from Headteacher

Wishing you all a very happy 2024 which, as I'm sure you'll be very aware, is the 400th year of the school's founding. While the main celebratory events take place later this year - I hope to see many of you at the Dinner on June 29th or at the Summer Festival on July 13th - "400" has been a recurring theme throughout the last term at school. When we arrived back in school after the Christmas break, Cloisters, Home Square and the route to the Mountfield Theatre had been decorated with bunting, adorned with the commemorative crest. All year groups were welcomed back into school with an assembly which reminded them of the story of the founding of the school and how this year provides us with an opportunity not only to look to the past, but also to examine the present and to consider our hopes for the future. Fittingly, I feel, the school song was sung by each house in the first Chapel assembly of the year. Then, later in January, we were able to open the Centenary Hall, a beautifully designed social study space for our 450 Sixth Form students to work in during their noncontact periods with desk space, laptop and USB charge points and The Stage cafe. Nevertheless, the showpiece of this modern space is a beautiful stained glass window which picks up the theme of the 400th anniversary, cleverly marrying different motifs from the last 400 years to where the school



is today. You will read more in this newsletter and in The Borlase Review about events such as the incredible Jesus Christ Superstar musical production and also the Jazz Night which paid tribute to Ken 'Snakehips' Johnson while showcasing the extraordinary musical talent in the school. Success has continued to be found on the netball courts and the hockey, rugby and football pitches with many teams reaching the latter stages of district and regional competitions although the unseasonably wet winter and spring has meant that our new Director of Rowing has only been out once on "our" river since his arrival in November! I look forward to bringing you further news as we move on through the year.




Celebrating Borlase's Longest-serving Staff

At the end of September 2023, Ed Goodall contacted me asking whether the Old Borlasian Club would like to support an idea that he had had for a new honours board in the Cloisters, celebrating members of staff who had given 20 or more years' service to the School. What a wonderful idea, I thought. Of course, the Club would be delighted to support this wonderful initiative.

For many years, Andy Howland (Staff 1989–2008) had maintained a list of the long-serving teaching staff at Borlase. So far, so good! However, we wanted the board to be as inclusive as possible and, therefore, also to recognize the long service of many non-teaching members of staff. Finding accurate records for these individuals proved to be more difficult as they were not routinely listed in *The Borlasian magazine*, which was a major source of information on the teaching staff. Nevertheless, with the use of HR records, archive research and many e-mails back and forth, a list began to emerge.

Impressively, we identified 66 individuals who had given more than 20 years' service to Borlase since 1900. The longest serving of these was Russell Sage (Staff 1934–1987), who taught Modern Languages at the School for 42 years and was also master in charge of rowing. Of the more



recent Staff, many generations of Borlasians will affectionately recall Cynthia Ayres who taught Biology for 39 years (Staff 1970–2013, over two periods), Peter Heywood who taught Design & Technology for 35 years (Staff 1984–2019) and Tony Shannon who taught History and Politics for 35 years (Staff 1974–2009). The longest-serving Headteacher in this period was William S. Booth (Staff 1927–1956), ably supported over those 29 years by his wife, Mrs Minnie Booth, followed by the Rev. Albert J. Skinner (Staff 1904–1927) and Dr Peter A. Holding (Staff 1997–2018).

As mentioned above, dedicated service was not restricted to the teaching staff. Similar commitment has been shown by School secretaries, receptionists, bursary and administrative staff, laboratory technicians and language assistants. Caretakers seem to have especial longevity: Aubrey W. Brown (Staff 1937–1961), Cyril Smith (Staff 1962–1986) and Ray Kipping (Staff 1994–), currently supported by Brett Bagley (Staff 2003–) and Rick Neill (Staff 2004–).

And long service is not a relic of the twentieth century! As many as 13 current members of Staff have been at Borlase for 20 years or more. The longest serving of these is Paul King, who joined the Staff 35 years ago in 1989 to teach Geography. Does he have the stamina to surpass Mr Sage's record of 42 years? Only time will tell! Other teachers with similarly impressive

service are Hugh Robson who teaches English and plays the Chapel organ (Staff 1996–), Karen Rooke who teaches Biology (Staff 1999–) and Jane Blane who teaches Geography (Staff 2000–).

We thank and celebrate all these individuals for their long and dedicated service and for helping to shape both Borlase School and countless generations of Borlasians into what they are today.

Borlase and RAAC

Borlase is one of 4 schools in Buckinghamshire and 234 schools in total containing a small amount of low risk RAAC (Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete). RAAC was used as a cheaper alternative to standard concrete in the 80s and 90s.

It has now been confirmed that Borlase will receive grant funding to remove it from its buildings.

All pupils remain in face-to-face education with no disruption to the delivery of teaching or risk of school closure.

Where are they now? – DAN NIXON (2005 - 2012)

I spent many a joyful hour in the technology workshops during Key stages 3 and 4 (but rarely actually finished a project). My sixth-form years saw me busy studying Maths, Physics, Chemistry and Geology, but I still managed to find time for my numerous hobbies both in and out of school.

As a member of Astronomy Club, I was given the opportunity to travel to space camp in Alabama (and became potentially the only person to dance the Time Warp in lunar gravity)! I was also an active member in two of the senior choirs, a hobby that I continued throughout university - in fact I met my wife Lucy at the Imperial College Choir. I also participated in the production of Fiddler on the Roof (I do still occasionally dance around the kitchen singing my favourite musical numbers). Outside of school my main passions were music and martial arts. Whilst I don't play my piano as much as I probably should these days, I am a second-Dan black belt at Tae Kwondo and even occasionally instruct classes.

My schooltime efforts were rewarded with yet more studying when I finished at Borlase and went on to read Mechanical Engineering at Imperial College London. During uni I spent my free time singing, tap dancing and eating cheese (occasionally at the same time).

After four years of books and one particularly off-the-wall project making a 3D printer that cooked chocolate brownies, I finished university with a Master's and went straight on to design ejection seats for fighter jets at Martin-Baker in Uxbridge. My love of engineering is still strong - there's nothing like the feeling of holding a finished product and then mercilessly testing it to destruction! Even after all these years, I still regularly meet up with the tight-knit group of school friends I made at Borlase and with whom I spent so much time around the school grounds (mostly hanging out in places we weren't meant to have access to and pushing each other into bushes).
